This reception is the culminating event of the *Preserving California's Japantowns Symposium*, which will bring together experts, practitioners and community members to discuss the historic and cultural preservation of Japantowns across California.

The Celebrating Our Japantowns reception is an occasion to celebrate the past, present and future of California's Japantown communities through music, food and other festivities. The discussions and outcomes of the one-day Preserving California's Japantowns Symposium will shape future directives and priorities for cultural and historic preservation efforts of California's Japantowns. Anyone interested in learning about the unique history, opportunities and challenges of preserving the history and culture of our Japantown communities and how the latest in

A buffet reception and entertainment will be provided by a quartet led by Dr. Anthony Brown, an internationally acclaimed percussionist, composer and ethnomusicologist. A San Francisco native of Japanese and African/Native American descent, Dr. Brown brings with him extensive experience as artistic director of the Asian American Jazz Orchestra, a federally-funded national educational touring project about the Japanese American internment experience.

This symposium will address the following goals:

- Learn about the unique history, opportunities and challenges of preserving the history and culture of California's Japantown communities
- Network with 2004-2005 CCLPEP preservation grant recipients and other preservationists from across California
- Advance your own work and ideas by connecting with others who have faced similar preservation issues and concerns, and get a "heads up" on how you can respond when challenges and opportunities come your way
- **Collaborate** in panel discussions and interactive breakout sessions on the latest in preservation tools and techniques

Sponsored by the California Civil Liberties Public Education Program (CCLPEP) and the California State Library, this event will also offer 2004-2005 CCLPEP preservation grant recipients an opportunity to present the current progress and outcomes of their cultural and historic preservation work.

The *Preserving California's Japantowns Symposium* is organized by the Japanese Cultural and Community Center of Northern California (JCCCNC) in partnership with the California Japanese American Community Leadership Council (CJACLC) and the support of the California Cultural & Historical Endowment, California Preservation Foundation, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and the Nichi Bei Times.

Join us in engaging our communities to learn about the cultural and historic preservation of our Japantowns. Symposium fees are \$40 general registration, and \$10 student/senior registration.
